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Recording the Bass

Technology is here to stay. What's up to date in the recording session for the bass is the use of the interface. You can record your bass straight from a D.I. box to the audio interface. The D.I. captures the purest bass sound that you can get and some of them can emulate the sound of a bass head. Another way is through a preamp and then into the interface. Also, many bass amps have what's called a Direct Output. But, this output will give you a slightly more colored tone than the DI box.

Microphoning the cab is still an option. The type of microphone(s) and the placement will greatly affect the qualities of the final result. Some recording engineers prefer a combination of these three methods. Nowadays, many recording studios tend to avoid miking a cab for many reasons. Because it's really hard to get a good tone and there are many virtual amps and simulators that are working effectively.

As we have seen in this very important information, we have several options to record and obtain the bass sound that we are looking for in our recording sessions. We must consider everything; the instrument, the electronics, the strings, the cables, etc. All of this, is a conglomeration of things that also affect in one way or another, our sound and final result in the mix.

Of course, the most important thing is a good performance. This is basically the fundamental thing for a good bass track. A good advice is that you must be aware of the trends and demands of the music industry in order to obtain your goals. Good luck and keep grooving!
